Undocumented in the UC: Stopping Student Marginalization Social Sciences 1, classroom 110

Undocumented students face a multitude of issues in the UC and are left vulnerable and marginalized in regards to their retention & success within higher education. Learn more about how this injustice impacts their education, how current policy initiatives affect different types of undocumented students, and how you can stop the stiamatization on our campus.

Deconstructing Islam: Identifying Roots of Islamophobia Social Sciences 2, classroom 75

This workshop intends to bring awareness about the misconceptions and stereotypes associated with Islam, highlight the discrimination that Muslims face in the U.S., show how the media influences the way we see Islam and Muslims, and provide tools that non-Muslims can use to be an ally.

Fighting the Stigmas: Mental Health in the **Queer Community Terry Freitas Cafe**

Come learn more about the dual stigmatization of mental illness in the queer community as we explore the complicated relationship of the gueer community with mainstream mental health care and the current medical violence faced by Queer People of Color caused by vertical discrimination and horizontal oppression. Emotional First Aid practices will be addressed.

Schools4Freedom: An Antidote to Modern Day Slavery Social Sciences 2, classroom 71

There are an estimated 46 million people enslaved around the world right now, more than at any other time in human history. Join Hilary Carr from the groundbreaking anti-slavery organization Voices4Freedom to find out about Schools4Freedom, their innovative transitional school model educating child slaves and in the process freeing entire villages from generations of slavery.

Behind the Sound Waves: Music and Social Justice Activism Namaste Lounge

Examine how music interrelates with social justice movements and the importance of arts activism. Nora Rahimian, co-founder of #CultureFix, will present powerful examples of musicians around the world working for positive change in their communities. The workshop will explore music as a process as opposed to simply a product, and will look at how we can measure the impact of a song or other creative work.

Sparking Change Through Environmental Justice Activism Namaste Lounge

Using case studies from Kettleman City, Bayview Hunters Point, and South Central LA, the workshop will evaluate how POC communities can and have fought for environmental justice. With practical knowledge and an in-depth look at how the people in these specific communities have been affected, attendees will be able to start sparking change themselves.

Domestic Violence: An Effect of Normalizing Hyper-masculinity Social Sciences 2, classroom 75

What is domestic violence, and how do media and hypermasculinity perpetuate all types of violence? Join us in exploring domestic violence through the lenses of hypermasculinity and media, and learn how to detect domestic violence and how to intervene and break the cycle.

Transphobia: Bathrooms and Beyond Social Sciences 1, classroom 110

What is trans*? What is transphobia and what can I do to stop it? In this workshop we will explore transphobia in the U.S. and how this prejudice has evolved over time. We will explore recent legislation and focus on the social consequences for trans* people, while giving you some tools for making your spaces safer and inclusive of all.

Driscoll's Berries: Deconstructing Labor Exploitation Social Sciences 2, classroom 71

An interactive, panel-style format, this workshop will focus on the labor abuses Driscoll's Berries imposes on their agricultural workers. The diverse lenses of the lead organizer for the Driscoll's boycott in Santa Cruz, the Executive Director of the Center for Farmworker Families, and a former farm worker will provide an in-depth look at the issues as well as offering tools for creating change.

Empowering Children Through Social Activism Terry Freitas Cafe

Young children are usually not included in the conversation of social justice and activism even though they are aware of the social injustices around them. This hands-on workshop will teach attendees some ways they can talk to children about social injustice and engage them in activities that empower them to find their voices and be participants in social change.

Eddy Zheng understands firsthand the difficulties, barriers and frustrations that immigrant youth are going through, having immigrated to the U.S. from China with his family when he was 12 years old. Eddy's mission is to use his experiences to inspire and motivate young people to invest in their education, raise awareness about the detrimental impact that the Prison Industrial Complex has on the Asian and Pacific Islander (API) population, and promote racial harmony among people of color.

As a tireless advocate-educator, and through extensive public service and community involvement in the San Francisco Bay Area, Eddy raises awareness about the impact of criminalization and deportation on the API community and ensures that the API voice and experience is included in the larger movement to end mass incarceration in the United States.




