Do Your Part Through Art Namaste Lounge

In this hands-on workshop Favianna Rodriguez, internationally renowned artist/activist, will discuss the ways that art can be used to empower, educate, and transform our communities to be socially and politically active. Participants will create social justice themed art wpieces on site.

Beyond the Binaries Terry Freitas Cafe

This workshop will explore the intersectionality of gender and sexuality, moving beyond the binary approach to a much more complex and representative view of human experience. Andre LeBlanc, a Bay Area educator on these important issues, will bring his knowledge and insight to this interactive and informative program.

Holistic Agriculture: Building Sustainable **Models**

SSI, Room 110 Can agricultural models be sustainable if they do not address the present social, economic and environmental factors? This workshop will address the need for practicality in successful agricultural models and exploring versatility in sustainability efforts. Speakers from UCSC's Community Agroecology Network, an international network committed to sustaining rural livelihoods and environments. will talk about their field studies, projects and initiatives and how to get involved in supporting small-scale farmers, protecting the environment and humanizing global trade.

Drugs, Guns, Money, Gangs - Family, Friends, Community SSII, Room 71

Explore the untold truths and realities of gang associations, while beginning to understand why youth enter a life of gang warfare and the struggles that they, their families, and communities experience. Listen to the stories of ex-gang members and other associates, who shed light on this complex lifestyle. It is important to understand the impact of gang violence on youth and local communities. Insight into increases of gang violence and crime in small towns such as Salinas, California will be provided.

Black Gold: Oil Extraction in the Ecuadorian Amazon

Our oil dependency is endangering the Amazon rainforest and threatening indigenous peoples' traditional ways of life. UCSC professor Flora Lu will discuss her research on the specific impact oil extraction is having in Ecuador and show how oil companies colonize and destroy all in order to get some of that black gold.

Fatal Fashion: Labor Rights in the **Garment Industry**

SS2, Room 75 How often do you consider where your clothes were made? In countries around the world, millions of people endure horrible and often life threating conditions to produce clothing found in many US stores. Many sweatshop workers experience dangerous working environments, poverty wages, and restrictions on union organizing. This workshop will provide insight into the harsh realities of the labor right violations experienced in the garment industry and tools for eliminating sweatshop abuses occuring worldwide.

Homelessness: Sparing More than **Just a Dime**

This insightful workshop explores the causes, effects and day-to-day realities that keep people homeless, and highlights several successful models for addressing this issue in the Santa Cruz community. Homelessness is a vicious cycle. The first step in breaking the cycle is to eliminate the stigmas and raise awareness of this social justice issue occurring just in the backyard of our community.

Removing Shame and Shifting Blame: Rape Culture and the Media

SSL. Room 110 How does the media inform how you perceive your body, your sexual expression and help determine the level of intimacy you experience? Ann Simonton, former top model and internationally acclaimed media literacy expert, will break down the ways popular culture and everyday language perpetuate blame and shame. Effective strategies to stop victim blaming will be offered.

UndocuQueer: Connecting Immigration Reform and Marriage Equality

Community Room US Immigration legislation is changing rapidly, and most of us have more questions than answers. Are the 11 million undocumented people in this country gaining a path to citizenship? Does the current bill prioritize Border Security over the needs of immigrants? Given the recent demise of DOMA, what are the implications for the LGBTQI community? In this workshop, our speakers will offer answers to these and other questions from both policy and personal perspectives. Given the urgency of these basic human rights, opportunities for advocacy will be presented.

Mr. Hernández ran for Congress in 2012 through the Democratic Party representing a district in the Central Valley and raising important platforms such as educational equity and immigrant rights. In 2005 Mr. Hernández started a non-profit foundation called Reaching for the Stars that strives to ensure opportunities for youth to pursue educational and professional goals. He continues to actively work for social justice in multiple arenas.
