ICE: Raiding Our Rights Namaste Lounge

Zahra Billoo serves the nearly 250,000 Muslims in nine Bay Area counties as a civil rights attorney and the Executive Director of the San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR). CAIR is an organization that works to uphold civil rights of American Muslims and foster a better understanding of the Islamic faith and its followers. Zahra provides direct legal services for victims of law enforcement targeting and Islamophobia, as well as individuals facing anti-Muslim discrimination. She works on community development and empowerment, and with the media to provide an American Muslim voice. Zahra spoke at the Women's March on Washington, and joined 27 (named and anonymous) plaintiffs in a lawsuit suing Donald Trump for injunctive and declaratory relief from the "Muslim Exclusion Order," known colloquially as "the travel ban."


